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DESCENT FROM SIR HENRY PYNN!

This document was written by Helena Blanche Frederickson (Aunt Blanche) to her niece Mary Alice Harris Jennings, who was interested in the Pynn lineage and later she inherited the wedding dishes of Elizabeth Pynn Harris which had been passed from first daughter to first daughter for over a hundred years.

Aunt Blanche is the sister of my Great-grandmother Victoria Alexandria Frederickson Weeks of the 4th generation.

Mary Alice Jennings, my mother's sister sent me a copy of this document in 1972 when I had first began genealogy. At the time I was nine years old.

TO WHOM IT MAY CONCERN:

Based on a document, under date of October 1896, received from the London, England, War Office, our direct line of maternal descent from Sir Henry Pynn is as follows:

Sir Henry and his wife Susanna Pynn had eleven children, of whom the third child, and first daughter, was our direct maternal ancestress. From her we trace our Pynn Lineage, to wit:

1. Elizabeth Pynn-Harris
2. Alice Leah Harris-Power
3. Mary J. Power-Frederickson
4. Victoria A. Frederickson-Weeks
5. Alice B. Weeks-Harris
6. Mary Alice Harris

The direct female descent was broken in the 5th generation by Francis X. Lawson, son of Mary J. Frederickson-Lawson, of the 4th generation, who bore no daughter.

Each of these maternal descendants, with the exception of Victoria A. Frederickson-Weeks of the 4th generation, bore more than the one child named for the purpose of this direct maternal descent.

According to information received from one Emanuel Pynn, son of one of the sons of Sir Henry, he, Sir Henry, was knighted by the King of England (probably George IV or William IV) for services to the Crown. These services consisted of forming a regiment of volunteers at Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, and fighting with much bravery, in Canada. This information may be found in Judge Frouse's "History of Newfoundland".

The destruction of the original and authentic papers, including the will of Sir Henry, destroyed by William Pynn, second son of Sir Henry, was due to a family feud. The tradition is that William Pynn paid the sum of Five Pounds Sterling (about \$25.00) to a London firm for securing copies of the papers and the will. Finding that his brothers were unwilling to assist in payment of the sum, he, William, would not give anyone the satisfaction of enjoying the knowledge of the heritage after he, William, was gone. While the authenticity of this feud may

not be gospel, it matters not now since the evidence of our heritage was destroyed. However, this same instance was passed on to me from my grandmother, Alice Leah Harris-Power, and my mother, Mary J. Power-Frederickson. Both stated that fire was the means of destruction.

The estate was held in Chancery for many decades after the destruction of the paper evidence, but none of the descendants had sufficient money to pay the cost of going to England and instituting legal search. The Chancery periods have long since expired.

It is my belief that the name "Pynn" was pronounced Penn. Mary J. Power-Frederickson, of the 3rd generation, so pronounced it.

There is no definite evidence that the Pynn family was in any way connected with the Penns of Pennsylvania, although Mary J. Power-Frederickson of the 3rd generation, stated that Elizabeth Pynn (her grandmother) wore the Quaker kerchief, and maintained an almost unbroken silence during the only time the two met.

There are further ramifications of descent through other offspring of the various generations, but to the best of my knowledge and belief the foregoing statements concerning the direct maternal descent are true.

IN THE NAME OF GOD, AMEN:

I, WILLIAM TEED, of Stephentown, in the County of Westchester and State of New York considering the uncertainty of this mortal life, and being of sound and perfect mind and memory, blessed be Almighty God for the same, do make this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say:

First: I give and bequesth unto my beloved wife Anne Teed, all my lease hold estate
Secondly:

I give and devise unto my son Isaac Teed the farm or tract of land lying in Stephentown, aforesaid, that I purchased of James Wilson which my said son Isaac Teed now lives, containing by survey one hundred thirty six acres and a half an acre of land to him, his heirs and assigns forever.

I also give and bequesth unto my grand-daughters, Susanna Vanvorus, Ann Wright, Elizabeth Sands, Hannah Wright, Charlotte Teed and Phebe Teed, the daughters of my son Charles Teed, deceased, the sum of fifteen hundred dollars to be equally divided among them provided they stand to abide and perform the covenant or agreement they have stipulated or entered unto with their brothers John Teed, Samuel Teed, Charles Teed and Stephen Teed respecting the settling or dividing the estate of their father, Charles Teed, deceased, which said covenant or agreement is that they, my grand-daughters aforesaid, should accept and receive from their said brothers the sum of seven hundred and fifty dollars each in full satisfaction of their rights or proportion of the aforesaid estate of their father, Charles Teed, deceased; but in case they, my aforesaid grand-daughters Susannah Vanvorus, Anne Wright, Hannah Wright, Elizabeth Sands, Charlotte Teed and Phebe Teed, or either of them, should not stand to abide and perform the covenant or agreement which they have entered into or stipulated with their brothers, John Teed, Samuel Teed, Charles Teed and Stephen Teed, as aforesaid, then in that case my will is and I do hereby direct it so to be that they or either of them so neglecting or refusing to stand to abide, perform and keep the covenant or agreement, aforesaid, that then she or they so neglecting or refusing shall not have their equal share of the said sum of fifteen hundred nor any part thereof; but I do hereby give and bequeath the said share or shares off her or them so neglecting or refusing (if they or either of them should neglect or refuse) to stand to abide to perform the covenant or agreement which they have entered unto or stipulated with their brothers, as aforesaid, unto their three brothers, my grand-sons, Samuel Teed, Charles Teed and Stephen Teed, to be equally divided among them.

And I do hereby give and bequeath unto my grand-son Samuel Teed, the son of my son Charles Teed, deceased, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars; and I do also hereby give and bequeath unto my great-grand-son, Charles John Teed, the son of my grand-son, John Teed, the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars to be put out at use by my Executors as soon after by decease as they shall be able by the reception of my property or estate to enable them so to do and to continue the same out on interest until he, the said Charles John Teed, shall arrive to the age of twenty one years and the interest arising from the said two hundred and fifty dollars to be annually paid to Jane Teed the wife of my grand-son, John Teed, and her daughters for them to use and do with as they may think proper and in case my said great-grand-son, Charles John Teed, does not live to arrive at the age of twenty-one years that then the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars hereby given to him shall go to and be given to Jane Teed, wife of my grand-son, John Teed, and her daughters.

Will of WILLIAM TEED continued

I do likewise give and bequeath unto my daughter, Nancy Bloomer, wife of Reuben Bloomer, all my household furniture, and

Lastly:

As to all the rest, residue and remainder of my personal estate, goods and chattes of what kind or nature soever I give and bequeath unto my son Isaac Teed, my daughter Nancy Bloomer, my grand-daughter Sarah Bailey, wife of Levi Bailey, and my grand-daughter Nancy Dusenbury, to be equally divided among them.

And I do hereby nominate and appoint my son William Teed, and my grand-son Samuel Teed, Charles Teed's son, my Executors of this my last Will and Testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me made.

IN WITNESS, I have hereunto set my hand and seal the sixteenth day of February, in the year of our LORD one thousand eight hundred and seven.

WHEREAS, In and by my last Will and Testament I have given and bequeathed all the rest and residue and remainder of my personal estate to my son Isaac Teed, my grand-daughter Nancy Dusenbury, wife of Nathan Dusenbury, my daughter Nancy Bloomer and my grand-daughter Sarah Bailey, wife of Levi Bailey, to be equally divided among them, I do hereby order and declare that my will is that all the rest, residue and remainder of my personal estate be given and paid to my son Isaac Teed, my daughter Nancy Bloomer, my grand-daughter Sarah Bailey, my grand-daughter Nancy Dusenbury and my grand-son John Vernal, to be equally divided among them, and

Lastly:- It is my desire that this my present Codicil be annexed to and made a part of my last Will and Testament to all intents and purposes.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written.

WESTALL

WESTALL-Thomas, a/k/a William McGillis Westall-B. ca. 1780, in Scotland, possibly of a family with interests or know-how in the hatters line. Came to America prior to 1804. Lived in Buncombe Co. and Yancey Co., N.C.. There he married Mary BRITTON, born in N.C.. About 1821, Westall removed to Texas. He bought some land in the Travis County area, was one of "The Three Hundred" who first went into Texas, and is found in the first Census of Texas, being listed as a stockman and farmer. He had two sons and one daughter at the time of the first Texas census (1826). Westalls have been found in Brazoria, Bastrop and Travis counties in Texas. Any help with this research will be most appreciated by Lt. Paul R. Westall, 1 N. Orange Building, Suite 509, Orlando, Fl.

BRITTAIN/BRITTON-Mary, born 20 July 1787, N.C. Father possibly James Brittain. Married William McGillis Westall (or possibly Thomas-known both ways in the family), ca. 1803. Their son William Britton Westall b. 1805. Her husband left and went to Texas, to which location she declined to go with an infant. Years later, they were divorced and each remarried. She was known to the North Carolina family as "Grannie Swann". She died 27 November 1864, in Yancey County, N. C. WRITE: Lt. Paul R. Westall, 1 N. Orange Building, Suite 509, Orlando, Fl.

NOTE: Lt. Westall would be pleased to have information of any type on the name Westall from N.C., Franklin Co., Tenn. or Texas, since it is so unusual, wherever it may be found.

HOMERVILLE NEWS

Oct. 20, 1894

Homerville, Ga. Oct. 15th. A little son of Seward Smith 21/2 years old fell from a porch and broke his leg a few days ago. He is doing as well as could be expected.

James C. Smith, 81 years old, was taken sick at his son's home near town a few days ago, with paralysis. He is now at his home five miles from town. He is not expected to live. He is a remarkable man, neverhaving been sick. He owned large stocks of cattle in this county, and knows more about how everybody's land lies in this county than anyone else, having travelled over it all his life looking after his stock.

The annual camp-meeting has just closed at this place. It was considered a good meeting.

An old man by the name of Juniper Griffis and his wife live about ten miles from here. They are both 90 years old; they walk three miles to Peagler's Still to do their trading. They do their own work, living on a farm where they raised a large family. Their descendants number scores and live around them. The old man has all his teeth and gets on a horse from off the ground like a young man.

H. J. Peagler has bought out the lands near here of the estate of the late R. B. Crum. It is a valuable farm. Mr. Peagler contemplates turning it into a fruit farm.

WILL OF JAMES TOOK

In the name of God Amen. I James Took of the Isle of Wight County in Virginia thanks be to God being in perfect memory do make this my last will & testament in manner & form as followeth: First, I do bequeath my soul unto the Hands of Almighty God - trusting to be saved by the Merits of Jesus Christ my Savior & Redeemer and my body do I bequeath to the earth and for that worldly good & effects that God hath blessed me with I do bequeath in manner & form following: I give unto my Son Thomas Took that tract of land which I do now inhabit & dwell upon the which tract of land is eight hundred acres as appeareth by the Patent of the said land and I do give this land to my son Thomas with all houses or housing that is upon. The same to him and his heirs forever with all the appurtenances belonging to the same. I give unto my daughter Dorothy, the wife of John Harvey, a feather bed & bolster, a rugg and blankett and a pair of sheets which is now at the Southward in the custody of the aforesaid Harvey, my son-in-law. Another pair of sheets I also bequeath to my daughter and half a dozen of napkins and a table cloth, a beer bowl of plate, a small silver dram cup and a silver spoon, a copper kettle, a pewter candle stick and a pewter chamber pot, a smooth iron and a small feather bed with a canvas ticking, two small rings, one with a stone, the other without. I give likewise to my daughter four cows and a heifer that is already in the custody of her husband, John Harvey, at the Southward. I give unto my son William Took one cow called Troublesome, and I give unto my son Thomas Took my signett seal ring, and my debts being paid I do give all the rest of my estate and my venture that I sent to sea or the produce of the same to my son Thomas Took after my decease. And I do in this my will give another tract of land called by the name of the White Marshes to my son Thomas Took and his heirs forever the land being mentioned for place and quantity in a separate patent by itself. Lastly I make, constitute and ordain my son Thomas Took my full and whole executor of this my last will and testament. In witness I have published the same this first day of February Anno 1659.
