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PIONEER MEDICINE

The American Pioneer did not have the blessings of modern medicine and as a result found it necessary to use what they had available to "cure their ills". Kitchen Spices were often used quite successfully as the cure for common maladies.

PEPPER was thought to cure and prevent all ills "from the toothache to the plague" and was used generously in gargles, teas, preservatives, etc.

ALMONDS were used for insomnia and stomach; relief of headaches.

MUSTARD for: purifying blood; pains (poultice); footbath--colds.

POPPY SEEDS for sleep and Nerves; BASIL for tonic and bronchitis

CARAWAY seeds for gas, colic, cough, hiccoughs, preventing

loss of hair; DILL for love potion; FENNEL seeds for

reducing weight, tonic strong eyes; THYME for lungs.

BRIEF HISTORY OF THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH, ST. CLOUD, FLA.

Dedicated to the pioneers of the St. Cloud Presbyterian Church who builded well for us who came after.

"The past does not end -  
It only merges with the present,  
Only glides with silent step  
From yesterday into today -- and tomorrow."

"Before the streets of St. Cloud were cleared of trees and brush, and when there were only two completed houses in the town, but many tents scattered over the wide acreage of the colony, the religious life of St. Cloud began." This quotation from the Twenty-fifth Anniversary edition of the St. Cloud Tribune (Dec. 6, 1934) shows that the early settlers of this community were God-fearing people, desirous of building a town on solid foundations.

The first church service in this new community was held in the lobby of an uncompleted hotel building on Sept. 12, 1909. A Methodist minister from Kissimmee conducted the services. The next Sunday the Rev. S. S. Snyder of Kissimmee, a Presbyterian minister, preached. At this service a Union Sunday School was organized, and officers chosen. On Oct. 9, at the suggestion of Rev. Snyder, a union church organization was made. A committee was chosen which had charge of all union services, securing places for meetings, collecting money, and engaging ministers to preach, until the various denominations should be organized in the town and their buildings erected.

The Seminole Land and Investment Company, under whose auspices the town of St. Cloud was organized and laid out as a soldier's colony, gave each denomination land on which their churches could be built. The land received by the Presbyterian church was that on which the building now stands, the corner of Tenth Street and Indiana Avenue.

During those early months any place that was available was used for church services. Much of the time a gospel tent, loaned by the Baptist State Association, was used. Here it was that the First Presbyterian Church of St. Cloud was organized.

In April, 1910, a petition had been drawn up and application made to Presbytery for the instituting of such a church. This was signed by thirty-two persons, and presented to Presbytery by Rev. Snyder and W. L. Bartlett. The request was granted and on April 29, 1910, at 7:30 P.M., the Presbyterian Church of St. Cloud was organized at a meeting in the Gospel Tent by representatives of Presbytery. Following an address by the Rev. J. K. Nutting, seventeen persons were received by letter.

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DID YOU KNOW? Much of the "Old Coffee Road," a pioneer postal and vehicular route, is still in use today. The thoroughfare was opened under the direction of the State of Georgia in 1823, by General John Coffee and Thomas Swain. Beginning at the Ocmulgee River, below Jacksonville (Ga.), it ran some 120 miles via today's Lax, Nashville, Cecil, Barwick and Thomasville to the Florida Line. This early route provided a short way into Southwest Georgia and West Florida.

## AN OLD VIRGINIA BILL OF SALE

The Administrator of the Estate of Jacob Bumgarner returned the proceeds from the Bill of Sale to the November Term, 1823, in Wood County Court, Virginia.

A descendent of the Bumgarner family found and preserved this list, as presented in an Elizabeth, West Virginia, newspaper in 1941. Today, 152 years after the event, this rendition is made available. To aid the researcher, the list of purchasers has been alphabetized and limited to a one-time use of each name.

It is interesting to note the items being offered for sale, and to speculate upon the past activities of the family. Subsequent census records reflect that often these people were farmers. Certainly, the usual farm implements are shown here also: traces, double tree and chain, sled, a shovel plow and a furry (furrow?) plow, plus all the other harness needed for the use of horses.

There is evidence, also, of an apple orchard, as the apples, both "in a pile" and "in the hole" made one of the larger items. There was no cider press offered in the sale, but several cider barrels were purchased.

Of farm animals, there were two horses, bulls, steers, cows, heifers, calves: 20 geese which sold for a total of \$9.08, 24 hogs, \$35.80, and 17 sheep, sold in one lot, for \$32.01.

The farm produce, oats, corn (both in shock and in 275 bushels of grain), wheat, fodder, shucks and ten hundred weight of feed, sold as easily as the guns: rifle gun and pouch for \$12.37-1/2 and \$15.00 for the other like item.

We might judge that the house itself was of some size, as there were three bedsteads and furniture groups sold, plus three which

were called "bed and furniture", apparently to differentiate. There were chairs, chests, tables, etc. The Dutch oven and bales (sic), the kittles (sic) and kitchen hooks, etc., were made of iron. If one can judge from position on the list, all iron items made a ready sale.

The females in the family evidently had produced cloth and cloth products. Sheep shears were among the items, and one recalls the seventeen sheep on hand. There were looms and spinning wheels of different sizes, a set of spools, loom gears, reeds, etc., and bunches of wool besides wool in a bag and in skeans, plus broken flax in bundles, and some woolen quilts.

The gentlemen of the house did not expect the lady to sit only at the loom or spinning wheel, as there was a woman's saddle, which was purchased by another lady of the family.

The canoe would indicate that there must have been a nearby stream or body of water. For \$1.00 this item took the fancy of Levi Wells, who, for the most part, had been buying livestock and hardware

Extremes of the sale run from 13¢ for a bridle to \$69.00 for the brown horse. Although \$678.09-1/2 was obtained from this auction, one realizes the more personal items and the land were not included.

Wood County Court Fiduciary Accounts, Will Book 2, shows that the Administrator of this estate was Levi Wells, and the Appraisers were Charles Rockhold, James Davis and Adam Ruble, who appraised the value as \$852.38, which was not realized.

Further research reveals that Jacob<sup>1</sup> and his wife Sarah lived in Harrison County, Virginia ca. 1800, on West Fork River, before selling and coming to what now is Wirt County. On October 7, 1813, Virginia Governor James Barbour issued title to Jacob<sup>1</sup> for 372 acres of land on the South Fork of Hughes River. In 1815, George Click sold to this same Jacob Bumgarner 100 acres of land below Beauchamp Mills, on the Little Kanawha River, for \$1,000 cash. (DB 4, pg. 538, Wood County Clerk's Office). This deed stated that the purchaser was a resident of Wood County prior to this purchase.

It is found that the Bumgarners (father and heirs) owned property on the Kanawha River below the town of Elizabeth, on the Little Kanawha River, at Burning Springs Run, on Right Reedy, at the mouth of Lynn Camp, and that the "Bumgarner Farm" was located at Mingo Bottom. The only personal property found, and recited in the article was:
