## As Rifles Cracked

STOCKBRIDGE VETERAN WHO 'DIED' TWICE RECEIVES FINAL SALUTE

Stockbridge - The crack of '06 Springfield rifles in a graveside salute Wednesday - the same type rifle that once saved his life - wrote the final chapter in the life story of Joseph Blob, 64, Stockbridge World War I veteran who "died" twice.

Blob died of natural causes Sunday, almost 42 years after an adjutant general in the war department erroneously signed a death certificate declaring him "killed in action." He was buried at St. Joseph cemetery, Appleton, leaving behind a widow, three brothers and three sisters.

During World War I Blob was a member of Company H, 353rd Infantry, 89th division. He entered service April 26, 1918, and by July 1 of the same year was in the trenches, where he served in combat until the time of his "death", Nov 1.

On that date his outfit moved into the battle of the Arrgonne and a German shell burst about a dozen yards to the left of Blob and three buddies.

Blob was buried head down in the earth by the blast with only his feet remaining above ground. He often related to patrons in his Stockbridge tavern that he didn't remember much about what happened after that. Blob generally added that stretcher bearers later told him they assumed he was dead and went on to care for others. When they returned later they found he was unconscious but alive.

#### Life Line

Fortunately, he had just removed a cartridge from the chamber of his Springfield seconds before the enemy shell struck and the breech remained open. As he fell his face was next to the opened rifle barrel with the muzzle protruding above the earth's surface.

Though wounded, the slim supply of air through the rifle barrel kept him alive until he was rescued. Blob never again saw his three companions.

Four weeks later his parents received official notice of his death. They refused to believe the message and in fact turned down a government insurance settlement.

After months of hospitalization Blob returned to the Appleton home of his parents in March, 1919. His death certificate and clippings of many periodicals which told of his death were displayed behind the bar of his Stockbridge tavern.

Thus as breech bolts of the Springfields, now in the hands of Stockbridge Legionnaires snapped back ejecting spent brass just as Blob had done on that fateful Nov 1, 1918, the story of the man who died twice came to an end.

#### VETERAN PRIZES TELEGRAM TELLING OF DEATH IN ACTION

Stockbridge, Wis. - If necessity should require it, Joseph P. A. Blob of this village could go into a court and with duly authenticated documents prove that he has been dead for more than 17 years. A telegram of Nov. 18, 1918 addressed to his father, Joseph, and signed by an official in the American army headquarters in France, says so.

Blob, a private in Company A, 353d infantry of the American expeditionary forces was severely wounded in the battle of the Argonne. His death certificate was mistakenly made out Nov. 1, 1918. He had revived from his injuries sufficiently to write his parents Nov. 4 and again Nov. 7. These letters were received by his parents in due time. Then on Dec. 18, a telegram was received from army headquarters stating that Joseph had been killed in action Nov. 1.

The parents refused to believe this message, since they had received letters from their son subsequent to the date given. They refused a life insurance settlement which was offered them. Joseph returned home in 1919 and treasures the gelegrams and other papers which chronicled his death as a grim memorial.

## GENEALOGICAL SOURCE MATERIALS IN THE TENNESSEE STATE LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES

The Tennessee State Library and Archives has a large and varied collection of materials useful for genealogical research.

Published and manuscript family histories have been catalogued and arranged so that information on specific family names can be readily found.

Published Tennessee histories give background information. Biographical information on Tennesseans can be found through special indexes. Tennessee histories, manuscript material and newspaper clippings regarding events and people in the counties are arranged for easy access. Periodicals published by family associations, genealogical and historical organizations are in the collection as are standard guides to their contents. Not only are published works on Tennessee collected, but also works on other southern states and on regions from which Tennesseans came.

Compiled family histories and local histories cannot always provide information needed. Primary source materials must be searched for information. Not until the twentieth century has the state collected records most valuable to the genealogist, that is, birth, marriage and death records. Various sources must be used to find such information. Land records can give locations of specific persons in the state. Land to which North Carolina and Tennessee gave title is well recorded and the records are well indexed. From tax lists of the counties, minimum ages for the persons listed can be established. Census records can give approximate birth dates. All extant Tennessee population schedules before 1900 are available at the Tennessee State Library and Archives.

County records need to be searched for marriage licenses. These records are available on microfilm and, in some instances, in transcribed form. Wills give approximate death dates and also link generations. These are available in the county records.

Although there is no index to Tennessee newspapers, the marriage and death notices which appeared in the early Nashville newspapers have been listed.

The Tennessee State Library and Archives has a large collection of family records copied from bibles. These are indexed by principal families listed. The Tennessee Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the National Society of Colonial Dames have been active in collecting and preserving these records in the Library and Archives.

Military records of Tennesseans are housed here and indexes have been prepared to these records. Land records give information about soldiers who served during the Revolutionary War. Muster rolls of companies serving in the War of

## TENNESSEE STATE LIBRARY AND ARCHIVES - Con't

1812 are indexed. Records of soldiers who served in the War with Mexico, the Seminole Wars, and the Civil War are available. Unofficial records of Tennesseans in the Spanish-American and the First World War are also available.

The Library and Archives is open from 8:00 to 4:30, Monday through Saturday. The building is closed on all national holidays, Good Friday and on state and national election days. When a holiday occurs on Friday, the building is closed the following Saturday. When a holiday occurs on Monday, the building is closed the preceeding Saturday.

The Library and Archives is divided into areas according to the function each performs. The Library contains published material; the Archives, state and county records and the Manuscripts Section, private papers of Tennessean and Tennessee organizations. The Restoration and Reproduction Section provides photocopying services.

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## BROWSING CORNER

On Thursday, July 20, several members of the Society enjoyed a tour of Orange County Courthouse. Our guide was very nice and made sure we understood the arrangement of old records in all areas of the courthouse. She arranged for us to visit the section of the building that is off limits to the casual visitor - the room that will hold the 911 emergency call system.

The complete tour was very interesting to all of us, but the one room that held my attention was the <u>Law Library</u>. She told us that the library held records of litigation from the beginning of Florida records. As we did not have time to examine the books on that day, I decided I would go back at the first opportunity.

When I did go back to the Law Library, I looked around quite a bit, before going to the Florida books. Much to my surprise, I found records on most of the states in the United States. I got so interested in the books on Maryland that I did not even take them to the table (they are heavy), but instead sat in the middle of the aisle between the stacks and looked at as many as I could. This also saves precious time that would have been used in carrying the books back to their place, as the public is asked to reshelve the books that are used.

Many times I had asked about using law libraries, but had always been told that those books wouldn't have anything I would be interested in, so remember again - NEVER TAKES ANYONE ELSE'S WORD ABOUT WHERE TO FIND RECORDS - look for yourself. If a member of your family has been in litigation of any sort, there just may be a record of the case in the state records. In looking through one book, I saw records of a marriage. Who knows what else can be found in your Local Law Library.


