## Ancestry Revealed (formerly Ask Granny) Needs You! By Carol Mead

Our Ancestry Revealed volunteers help seniors complete a 4-generation pedigree chart along with a family group sheet, either in their independent or assisted living facility or at various churches and public venues. They are also given various documents that are found along the way- i.e. census records, ship manifests etc.. All this info is to be passed down to their children and grandchildren.

The program operates from September through May each year. Looking ahead to this coming September, we need more volunteers so we don't have to rely on every volunteer to participate in each event. WE NEED YOU!

If you are researching your own family, you already know how to do a pedigree chart. However training is available if needed and/or we can pair you up with a seasoned volunteer.

Sessions are held on two Wednesdays for each facility. Two time slot choices are offered: 10:00 am to 12:30 pm or 1:00 pm to 3:30 pm. We arrive 30 minutes ahead of time to set up our laptops and get connected to WiFi. A laptop or tablet is needed (occasionally we have an extra laptop for someone to use). We carpool when necessary due to distance or limited parking space availability.

The seniors we have helped have been thrilled beyond expectation at the results and the volunteers have been as thrilled too. Some volunteers will attest to the fact that their research skills have been expanded due to this program. So even if you haven't been doing genealogy for a long time, this program help you can advance and hone your skills.

#### One room school house - "White Settlement", Clarion Co, PA - 1931



Florence Ruth King (1911 - 2012) from Limestone Twp., Clarion Co., PA went to grade school in Kingsville, PA near her home. The closest high school in the area was in Summerville, PA. So Ruth and her sister Ethel stayed with Miles & Susan Enterline in Summerville during the week for 4 years and came home in a horse & buggy on weekends to do laundry and help at home. She then graduated form Clarion Normal School (now known ast Clarion State University) in 1931. Teaching degrees at that time only required 2 years of study. Her first job (pictured above) was at the "White Settlement" where she taught all 8 grades in a one room school house. She lived with the John White family near the school during her 3 years teaching at that school because she had no car. She then transferred to the "Brown Settlement" school where she taught all 8 grades in a one room school for two years while she lived with Mr. and Mrs. Arnold Brown.

## Correcting the Record - John Anderson (1816-1898) Private, Co. K, 1 Regiment NC Cavalry (9 State Troops)

Various sources, including *North Carolina Troops, A Roster 1861-1865, Volume II*, show incorrectly that my ancestor, John Anderson (1816-1898), deserted his unit during the War for Southern Independence. This error resulted from a failure by the original preparer of the compiled service record (CSR), who combined records for two men of the same name; and, by the failure of subsequent researchers to recognize the error when preparing their publications. A careful review of the CSR obtained at Fold3.com<sup>2</sup> makes it very clear that two men are represented.

In addition, because John Anderson and his widow Mary obtained pensions from the State of Georgia<sup>3</sup> for his service, we know that he did not desert the Confederate States Army. Deserters were not eligible for pensions.

The following is a summary of the portion of the Compiled Service Record that relates to John Anderson (1816-1898).

- 1861 Nov-Dec: Muster Roll present; enlisted 25 June 1861 by J. W. Woodfin at Camp Woodfin [probably in Macon County, North Carolina, his residence in 1860].
  - 1861 28 Nov: Receipt Roll pay for 25 June 1 Sep 1861. Rate of pay \$12.00, Raleigh.
  - 1862 Jan-Feb: Muster Roll present, sick in quarters
- 8 May: Certificate of Disability for Discharge disability by age and general inefficiency; also suffers from acute rheumatism when exposed to damp weather. W. L. Hilliard, Surgeon, 1st NC Cavalry
- 1862 10 May: Discharge Certificate discharged by T. P. Siler, Camp Mars [near Kinston, NC]; last paid through 31 Dec 1861; due \$52.00; born Buncombe County, NC; age 47; 6 ft 1 in; light complexion; grey eyes; light hair; farmer by occupation. Signed T. P. Siler, Captain.
- 1862 1 Jan 10 May: Receipt for pay appears on the bottom portion of the Discharge Certificate 4 months and 10 days at \$11.00 per month, \$52.00. Received of Major A. F. Cone, AQM, 13 May 1862, by Voucher No. 143, \$52.00. Signed John Anderson by his mark. Witness T. H. Holmes, Jr.
- 1862 May-June: Muster Roll discharged at Camp Mars, NC, May 10, 1862.

Undated Roll of Honor: John Anderson, 9th Regiment NC Troops (Cavalry); Macon County, [NC]; age 46; Volunteer; discharged for disability.

The physical descriptions of the above man and that of the one discussed below clearly show that they are two different men.

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Another John Anderson, Private, Company K, 1st Regiment NC Cavalry

Combined with the above CSR cards are those for a John Anderson, Private, 1st Regiment NC Cavalry, enlisted 27 November 1863 at Orange Court House, Virginia, by W. M. Adington. The physical description of this man is shown on his Oath of Amnesty, administered in Washington, D.C., on 22 March 1864. He was a resident of Alleghany County, NC; dark complexion; brown hair, blue eyes, 5 ft 6" height.

He is listed on a Prisoner of War Roll dated 28 January 1864, at Lincoln General Hospital, Washington, D.C., admitted from Kalorama Hospital. He deserted the CSA on 26 November 1863 at the Rappidan River. CSA muster roll records show him MIA as of 29 November 1863.

He was admitted to Kalorama (Eruptive Fever) U.S.A. General Hospital, Washington, D.C., on 30 December 1863, having contracted Variola (measles). He was returned to duty 25 Jan 1864, and admitted to Lincoln Hospital on 28 January 1864 where he was listed on the POW roll.

Of three books that describe the service of my John Anderson<sup>4</sup>, the entries are nearly identical, and all contain the same erroneous information. To investigate the accuracy of these entries, a secondary source must be used (CSR cards) because the original service records are no longer available to the public. If the CSR attributed to John Anderson had been carefully reviewed by any of the persons who cite it, it would have been immediately obvious that two men were represented. In this case, using the book abstracts alone would lead a family historian to believe a completely false assertion. It's impossible to stress enough the importance of checking the original source of the information you wish to use.

#### RESEARCH AT THE LIBRARY OF VIRGINIA

This is Virginia's state archive, a wonderful facility for anyone researching family history in Virginia. I have researched there several times, and recently was able to spend two glorious days conducting research. The physical building is located at 800 East Broad Street in Richmond, phone 804-692-3500. They're open Monday-Saturday 9:00 am to 5:00 pm. There is a dedicated parking garage, which is fantastic! It's underground, secure, never crowded, and **free**! Your car doesn't get hot, you don't get wet if it's raining, no snow, and no hunting for on-street parking.

The library is divided into two sections – books and microfilm. After registering, it's recommended that you check the book side first. They use Library of Congress filing system, which I'm not familiar with, so had to get help with that. Staff are exceptionally helpful. County books are arranged alphabetically. There may be many for some counties, but few for others. There are lots of other books, but since I didn't use them, I can't describe them.

Their online catalog includes books & journals, archives & manuscripts, and images & indexes databases. To search all at once, use the "full catalog" page, or separately by clicking on the catalog name. I had used this extensively in the past with much success, but became frustrated this year when searching. When I mentioned this to one of the employees, I got the best tip ever - *On the home page, go to the bottom of the page. Click on "site index". This brings up alphabetical listings of all online databases – bunches!* You can spend hours just looking through to see what's available.

An example from my research: I had information that an ancestor had a patent or grant of land dated 1749 in Augusta County. I had book and page #. When speaking to an employee, I was told the deed books for Augusta were numerical, not alphabetical. Hmmm! Later, when talking to another employee, I discovered "my" deed was a Northern Neck grant from Lord Fairfax, lord proprietor of the Northern Neck. Sure enough, these grants are in alphabetical books. They are images of the original grants beginning in 1690.

Not only are the original grants included, but also succeeding documents regarding the originals. My Peter Lienberger and his brother John received the grant in Augusta county in 1749. John died about 1771, having distributed this and two other grants in his will to his children and siblings. I haven't seen the will yet, but the Northern Neck grant books include this information, with a new deed to each legatee. Additionally, it appears that each daughter put her land in his husband's name. All of this is included in the grant book, not Augusta county deed records!

When you're tired of books or want a change of scenery, move to the microfilm area. You're assigned a reader, the filing system is explained (very simple – all county records are together and logically marked on the boxes). They have newer style computerized microfilm readers, which may take a little getting used to. You can either save images to a flash drive, or send it to their printer. The negative is that you can only get 11"x17" images, but it's a simple matter to have them reduced at a copy shop at home. Oftentimes I want a hard copy to make sure I have a good image, as opposed to discovering when I get home that my image is distorted in some way.

I've only dealt with county records and don't know what other information is on microfilm. Based on the number of file cabinets, I'm guessing there is much more data available.

The library has a cafe with sandwiches and salads made to order – very good, plus a quiet place to eat and relax. There is a gift shop, which I've managed to avoid!

If you have Virginia ancestry, you should consider planning a trip to Richmond. I don't think you'll regret it!

#### LEUENBERGER / LINEBARGER - Switzerland > North Carolina

Part Two by Sallie Belperche

In the Winter 2014 (V. 46:1) issue of *Buried Treasures*, I told the story as I knew it at that time of my Swiss ancestors coming to America. I knew they arrived in Philadelphia from Charleston, South Carolina, in 1735, but had no knowledge of how they got to Charleston.

Earlier this year I found an online database, South Carolina Ships' Lists, . <a href="http://sciway3.net/proctor/SC ships.html">http://sciway3.net/proctor/SC ships.html</a>. This listed two ships that arrived in Charleston from England in July 1735, timely to arrive in Philadelphia in late August. One of the ships was the bilander *Oliver*, the same ship the Leuenbergers sailed to Philadelphia. However, the ship's captain was different. Inquiring minds (mine) wanted to know why!

I recently conducted on-site research at Addlestone Library at the College of Charleston. This facility has information I had been unable to locate elsewhere. They have microfilm of the newspaper *South Carolina Gazette, Charlestown*, including issues of 1735.

"Charlestown, July 26. On Sunday last arrived here Capt. Robert Robinson, mentioned in our last, with about 200 Palatines, most of them being poor, they are obliged to sell themselves and their Children for their Passage (which is six Pistol(e)s in Gold per head,) [Note: a pistole was worth about 17 shillings 6 pence each] within a fortnight from the time of their arrival, according to the Agreement they made with the Captain, or else to pay one Pistol(e) per head more to be carried to Philadelphia. They are most of them Farmers, and some Tradesmen. About 220 of the Switzers that have paid all their Passages, are now going to Edisto to settle a Township there. The Government defray's them upon their Journey, provides them with Provisions for one Year, and gives them 50 Acres a head; they are exempt from all Charges for Ten Years. The Quantity of Corn bought for them has made the price of it rise from 15 s. as it was last week, to 20 s.

I have by me a Copy of the humble Address of the Grand Jury for the Province of N. Carolina to His Excellency the Governor Gabriel Johnston, with the Excellency's Answer thereto, wherein his Excellency tells them plainly about paying the Quit Rent, that if they think it a hard Bargain, they may leave the King's Lands (it being his Land and not theirs) assoon(*sic*) as they please, there being to his Excellency's certain Knowledge thousands of industrious Protestants who would gladly come into their Places, and thankfully pay the Crown double their Rents without all such Clamour and Noise" [From 26 July 1735 issue of *South Carolina Gazette*, *Charlestown*]

"Charleston, August 9 - On Monday night last [Note: 1 Aug] Capt. Robert Robinson, Master of the Billander, called the *Oliver*, got up, and was seen by one of the Passengers, going forward to the head of the Vessel, and no further notice taken of him, but in the morning, was miss'd, supposed to be fallen over board. A Sloop coming up the River last Friday [Note: 5 Aug] saw the Sharks tossing up a Man in the Water, and tearing him to Pieces, having on a Scotch Plad(sic) Banyan, confirms this supposition, he having been that night in such a dress." [From 9 Aug 1735 issue of *South Carolina Gazette, Charlestown*]

I can imagine my 6<sup>th</sup> great-grandmother Elisabeth Leuenberger panicking about the shark attack and keeping a very short leash on her 5 children, ages 3 to 25!

[Note: A gentleman's <u>banyan</u> was a loose, informal robe to be worn instead of a coat. Influenced by Oriental fashion, these popular robes were also called Indian gowns, nightgowns, or wrappers. Despite the name "nightgown", the banyan was not worn for sleeping. Cut either in a loose T-shape or as a long simplified coat, they were acceptable wear for home or informal business. Also called a **morning gown**, *robe de chambre* or nightgown, made of cotton, linen, or silk, worn at home as a sort of dressing gown or informalcoat.]

"For PHILADELPHIA directly, The Billander Oliver, Samuel Merchant will sail next Wednesday [Note: 17 August]. For Freight or Passage agree with the said Captain, on board the said vessel, or with Capt. Hugh Peircy." [From 9 Aug 1735 issue of *South Carolina Gazette, Charlestown*]

A **bilander**, also spelled **billander** or **bélandre**, was a small European merchant ship with two masts, used in the Netherlands for coast and canal traffic and occasionally seen in the North Sea but more frequently to be seen in the Mediterranean Sea. The mainmast was lateen-rigged with a trapezoidal mainsail, but the foremast carried the conventional square course and square topsail. Displacement was typically under 100 tons. The bilander was short-lived, being replaced by more efficient designs, and few examples exist today. The word bilander comes from the Dutch and literally means "by-lander" because it was used on canals.

Additional information—The Billander *Oliver* was scheduled to leave Charlestown for London shortly after 22 November 1735. I did not check interim newspapers to see if the ship had been back and forth between Philadelphia and Charlestown after arriving in Philadelphia 26 August. I wonder if it really was going to sail to London in the winter? [From 22 Nov 1735 issue of *South Carolina Gazette, Charlestown*]



## A WELL-TRAVELED BIBLE AND THE KINDNESS OF STRANGERS

My great grandfather, David McCune, found himself in a sad situation. It was 1898, and Anna Lendahl, his young wife from Sweden, had recently passed away after contracting meningitis. David had two young daughters, and a thriving business as the town blacksmith in Ashland, Wisconsin.

He hired a housekeeper named Oline Hogan from Norway, who had recently lost both her husband and baby son. The domestic situation worked out very well - two years later David and Oline were married, and had a daughter and son together.

Many years later, David's eldest daughter (my grandmother Ruth McCune) and her sisters passed along family photos and stories to my mother, and then to me. My mother and I began compiling a family tree, which I was soon able to expand with the help of my computer, and eventually the internet. When genealogy on the internet was still young, I posted a query on a RootsWeb surname site, seeking other family members of the Norwegian / Hogan family who might be interested in having the family photos which had been passed along to me.

Several years went by. I was struggling with my

Swedish ancestors, not being able to find much before they arrived in the U.S. One day there was a message in my inbox - a Mr. Beard in Minneapolis had found a family bible at a rummage sale. It was a Norwegian Bible, and had been hand carried on the trip to America. Family information for the children of Ole Paulsen and Olie Olsdatter was listed, including several children who had immigrated to America and had taken the surname Hogan.

Under the older Scandinavian naming formats, the surname of the children would have been Olsen or Olsdatter, but there were probably many Olsens in Wisconsin and Minnesota by then, so the children chose to use the farmstead location name, which was Hogan. Mr. Beard had been seeking a family member to whom

he could send the Bible, and my posting was all he was able to find. He did not want any reimbursement; he just wanted to see the Bible returned to someone in the family.

So the Bible arrived at my home in Florida. I was so happy to see the information! By then Ancestry.com was on the scene, and I started a tree for the Hogan family. I soon got a connection in Norway and was able to post information about Oline Hogan's parents and grandparents. My mother remembered information about Oline's siblings in America, Peter and Elise, and their descendants, and we had several old family photos, so I was able to connect the online information with the photos.

Several more years went by. In 2011 I got an Ancestry hint about another member's tree with Hogan information. I contacted the member, and it turned out to be the great grandson of Peter Hogan, brother of Oline Hogan. The member had never seen a photo of his great grandfather, and I happened to have a photo of the four siblings who immigrated to America.

When I told him about the family Bible, he was flabbergasted. He had been searching for information for years, in and around his hometown of.....Minneapolis!! Of course I was happy to send the Bible back to Minneapolis, along with the family photos.

We have since been contacted by a woman in Norway, who believes the fourth sibling in the photo, Ole Hogan, may be her long lost great grandfather. The information in the Bible helped to confirm information she had from her grandmother.

Epilogue: About my Swedish ancestors? Use of the farmstead name by the Hogans got me thinking.....but that's another story!

#### **WORLDCAT - A BOON FOR GENEALOGISTS**

What is <u>WorldCat</u>? "WorldCat <a href="http://www.worldcat.org/">http://www.worldcat.org/</a> is the world's largest network of library content and services. WorldCat libraries are dedicated to providing access to their resources on the Web, where most people start their search for information...2 billion items available here through a library"

Searching WorldCat often helps find elusive material that is only available in one or two libraries - and never one that is close. Use the search bar to start your search. You'll get a list of results. Click on the title of the book to see which libraries own it and how far that is from your location. Below that will be a list of booksellers who have it and a complete description of the book.

I've found several booklets on John Barney, my ancestor who was a prominent name in the Masonic organization. Each booklet was available in only one library in the world - one in Vermont and the other in New Hampshire. An email to the librarian asking the cost of copying and mailing brought results in both cases; the librarians scanned and emailed the whole small booklets.

If you're looking for something in a larger book, first ask for a copy of the index for your names, places or topics. Then, if the index shows promising results, request those pages. The cost is generally very low-\$5 is the most I've ever paid - and service has been great. You'll probably have better results in smaller, less busy libraries, but even the larger ones have been helpful. Since Orange County libraries no .longer offer Inter Library Loan, this helps fill the gap.
